

Oral Statement at the 49th Session of the Human Rights Council Item 3: ID with SRSG on violence against children Date: 15 March, 2022 **Delivered by:**

Mr. President,

The SA government is failing to promote and support the best interest of the child¹. Most efforts are reactive in nature and inadequate to address the epidemic of child abuse inSA. Despite the SA government taking a pledge to increase child safety² and abolish all forms of corporal punishment in 2019³, the homicide rate for children is 5.5 per 100,000⁴, twice the global average.

Violence perpetuated against children is exacerbated by poverty, high exposure to violence, Covid-19 and widespread malnutrition which can stunt cognitive development, reasoning and result in violent responses⁵. Exposure to and experience of violence is resulting in high levels of trauma, mental health concerns and cycles of abuse.

The Justice Desk and Edmund Rice International, therefore, recommend:

- 1. Increased funding allocated for the non-profit sector to address the issue of violence against children.
- 2. The implementation of widespread compulsory preventative caregiver education.
- 3. Regular compulsory trainings for all teachersto effectively identify and report abuse.
- 4. Increased efforts to guarantee the first 1000 days of nutrition for all SA children.
- 5. To increase public campaigns to raise awareness onall forms of abuse.
- 6. The appointment of a child commissioner in every SA province.
- 7. The compulsory appointment of a child protection officer in all child-focused sectors.
- 8. Finally, to allocate a budget for access to mental health support for children, adolescents and caregivers.
